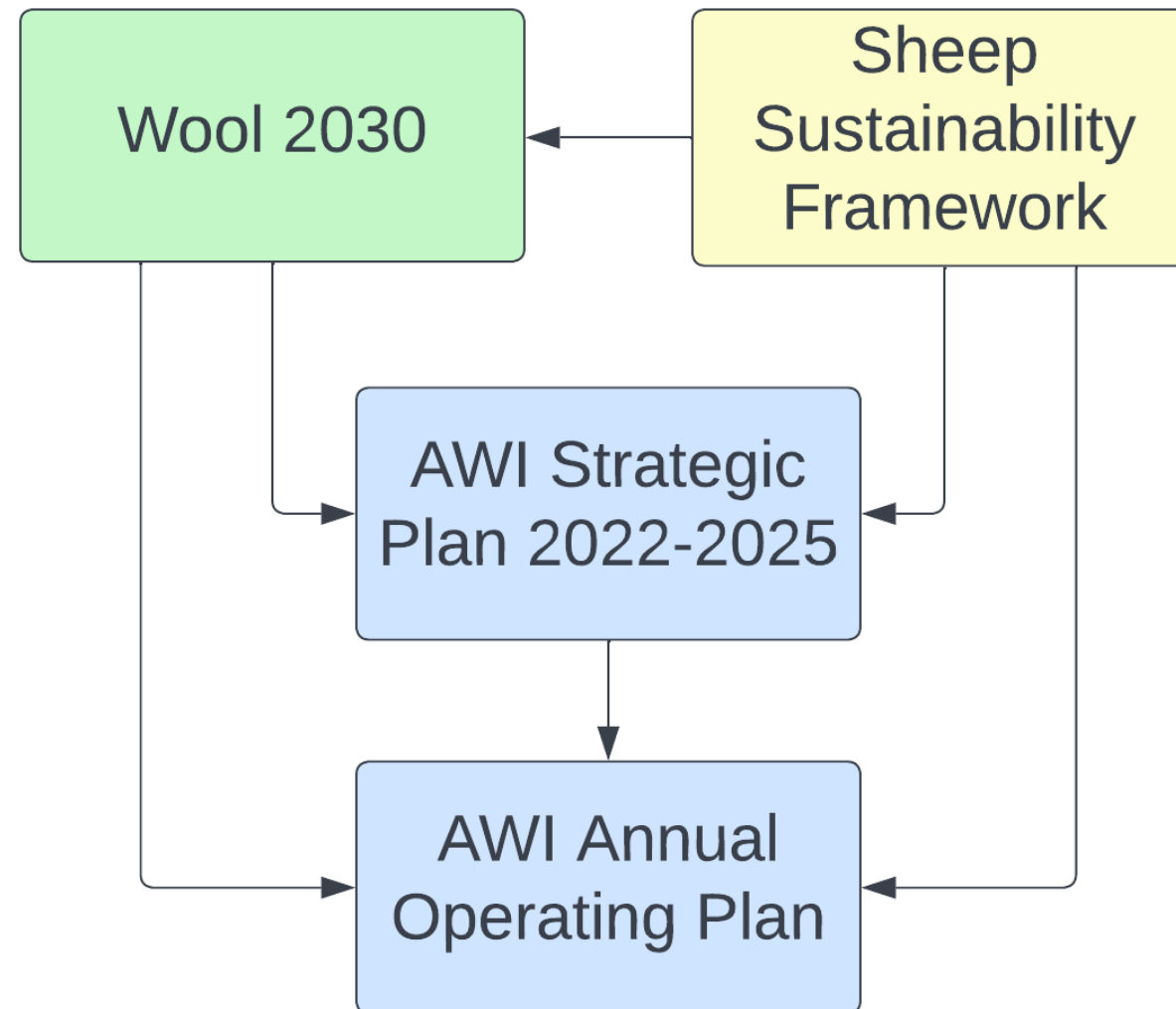

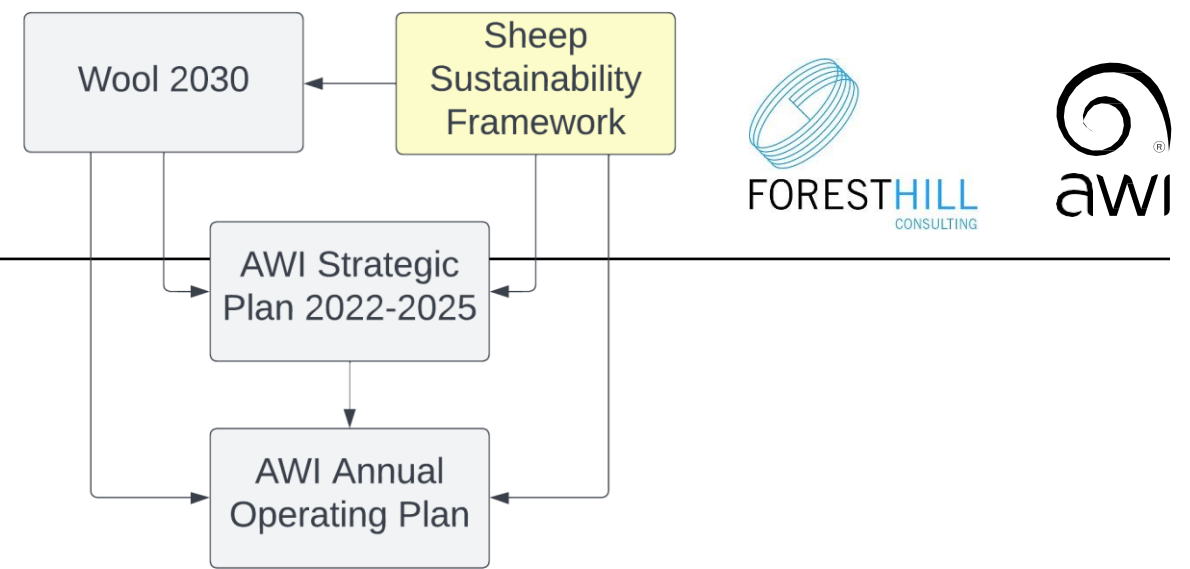

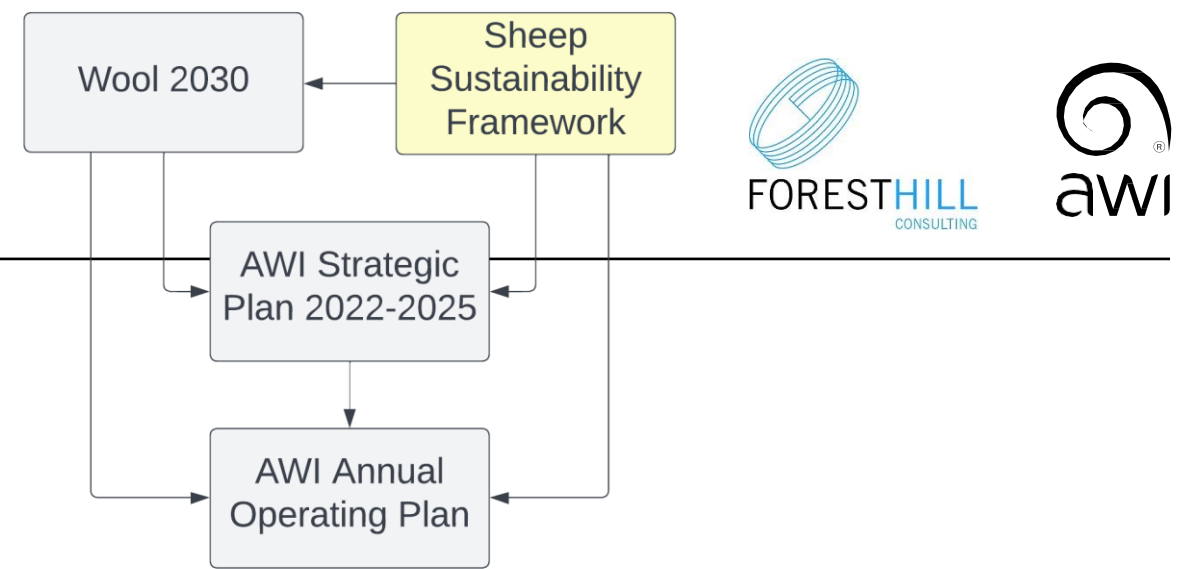




# Sheep Sustainability Framework

- ‘Owned’ jointly by WoolProducers Australia and Sheep Producers Australia
- Defines sustainable sheep production in Australia, sets and reports annual progress against metrics
- Does not set targets, but does inform industry priorities and targets

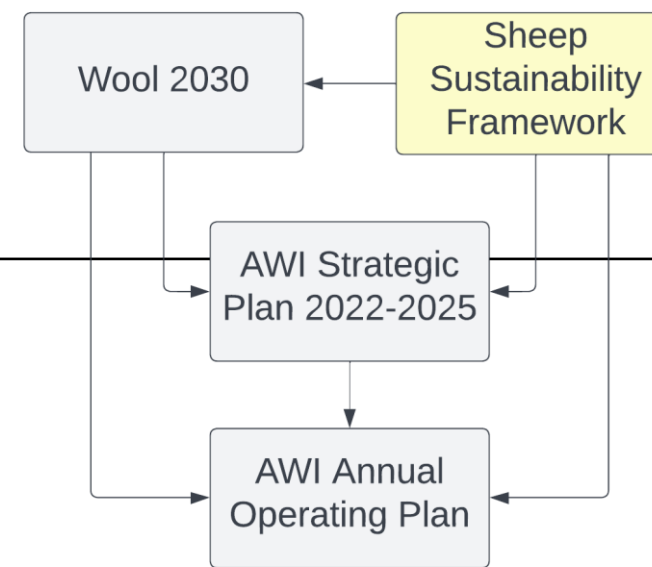




# Sheep Sustainability Framework

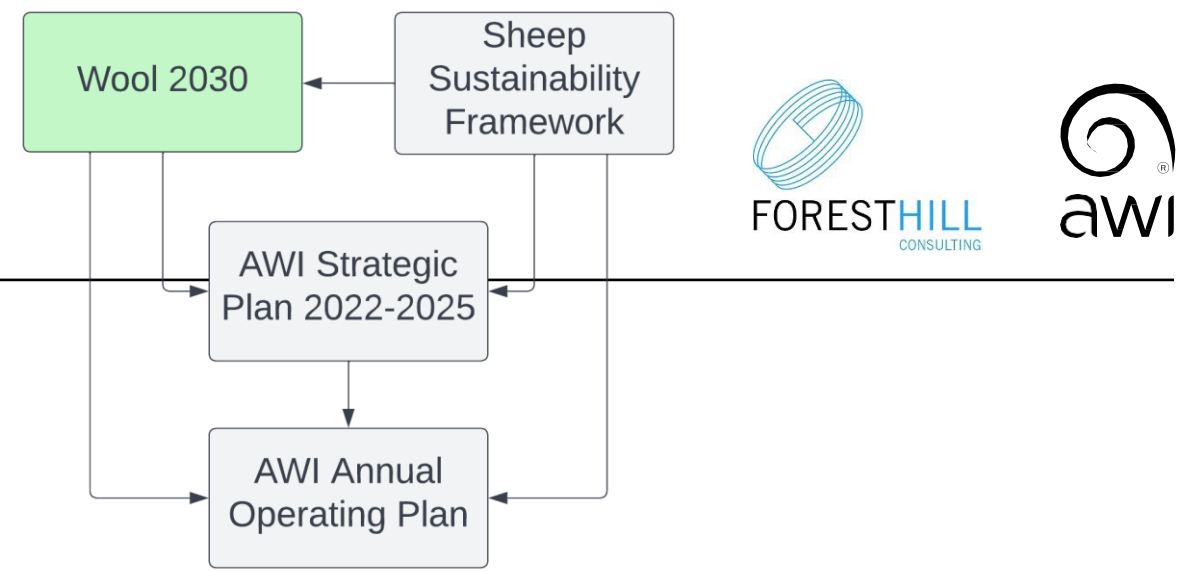
- Theme: Caring for our sheep (one of four)

Priority	Indicator	Metrics
1.1 Reduce, refine and replace painful husbandry practices	1.1.1 Level of mulesing in Australian flocks	1.1.1a % total flock mulesed (Merino vs non-Merino)
		1.1.1b % wool declared as non-mulesed (Merino vs non-Merino)
	1.1.2 Use of pain management associated with mulesing, castration and tail docking	1.1.2a % of producers who use pain management at mulesing
		1.1.2a % flock/producers where pain management is used for castration and tail docking



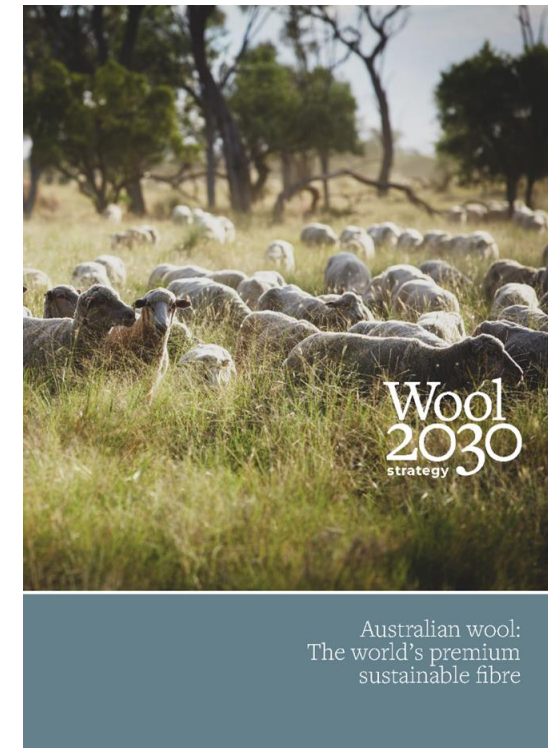

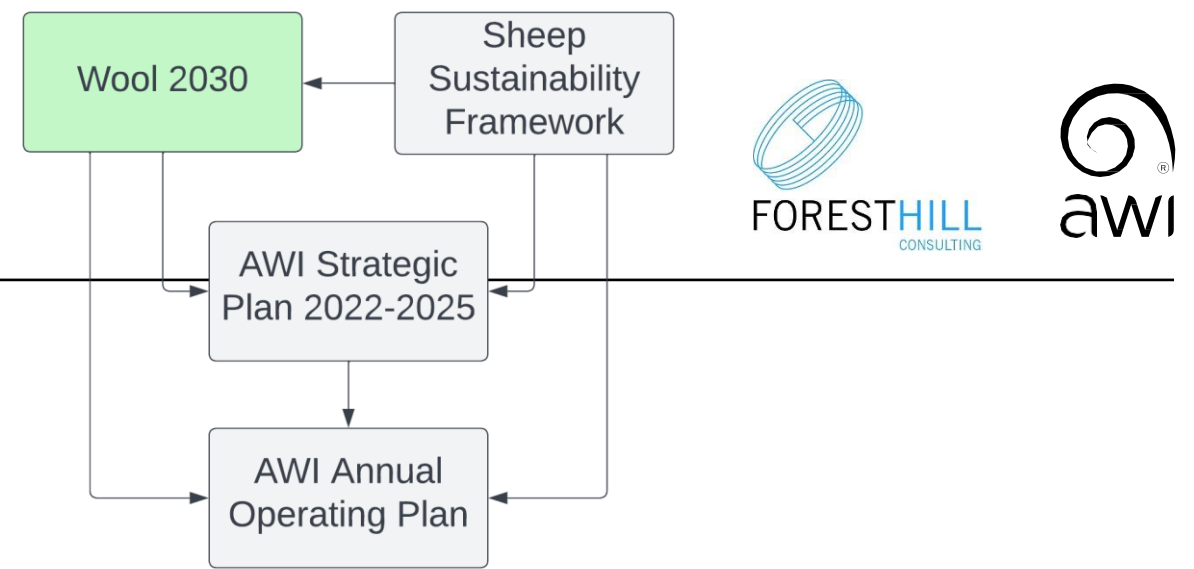

# Wool 2030

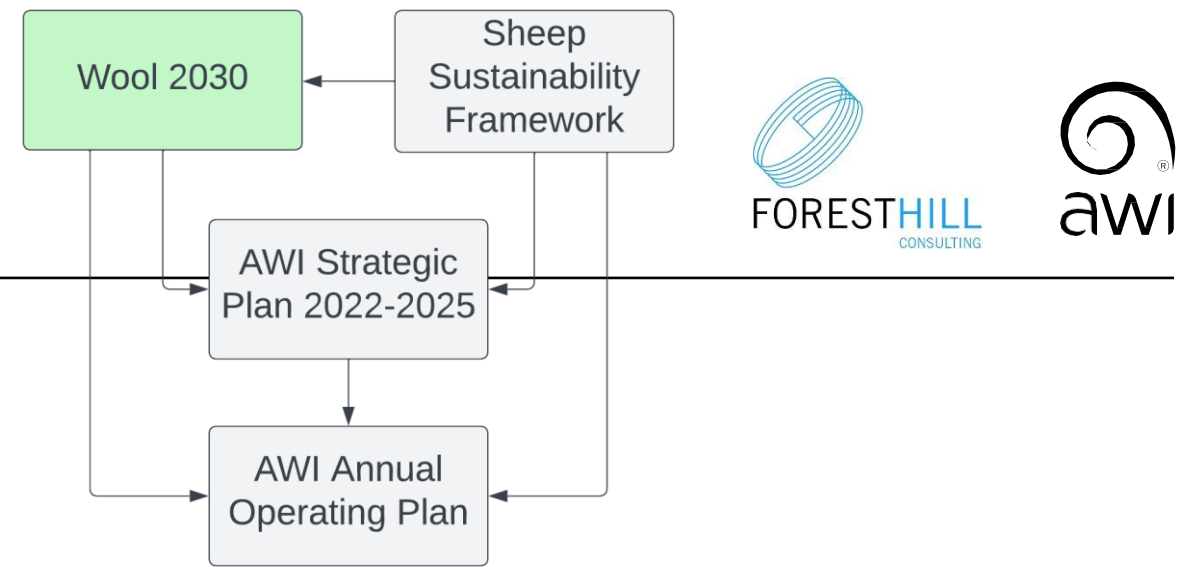
- Wool industry-owned plan covering all Australian participants

# Wool 2030

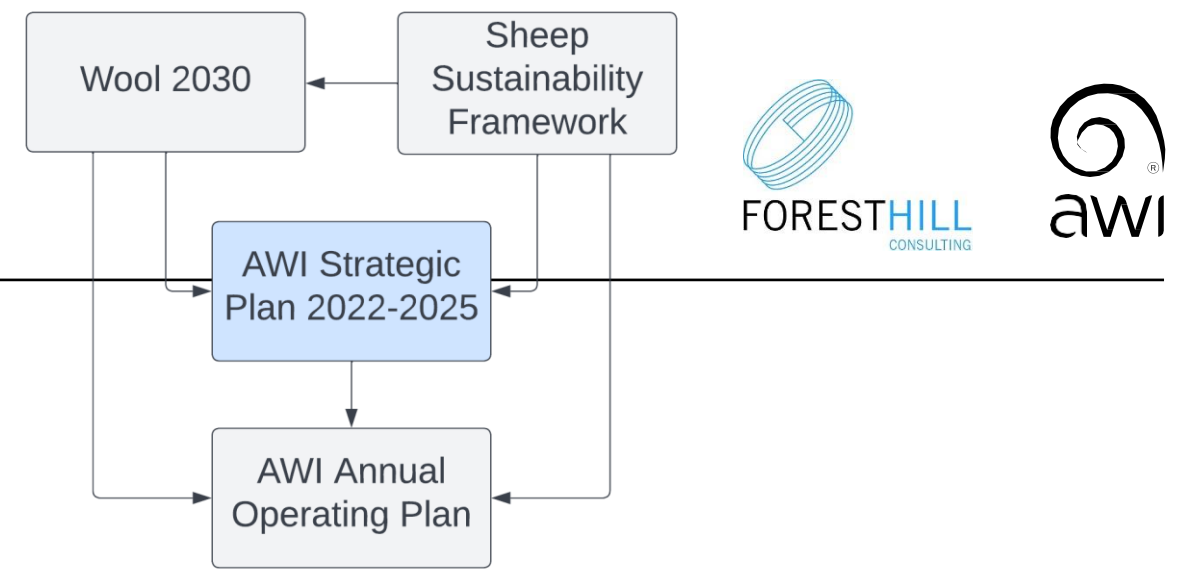
- Pillar: Caring for our animals and the environment (one of five)
- Two relevant priorities:
  - Continuously improve animal welfare
    - Meet the ‘Caring for our sheep’ priorities identified in the SSF, and the requirements of the Australian Animal Welfare Standards and Guidelines
    - Pursue a ‘3Rs’ approach to invasive procedures: Replace, Reduce, Refine
  - Priority: Protect our sheep against flystrike
    - Develop tools and systems so that growers have the confidence and the capacity to manage flystrike without mulesing



# Wool 2030

- Relevant pillar targets:
  - Growers have the confidence and tools to manage flystrike without mulesing
  - More than 50% of wool is sold under a quality certification scheme

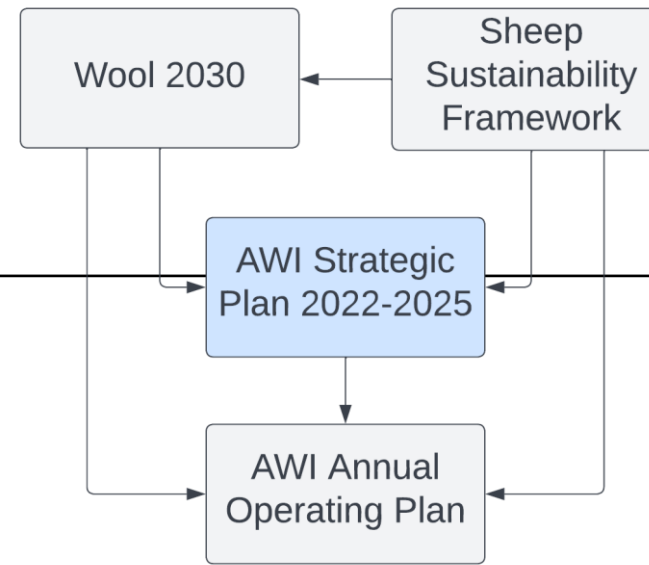




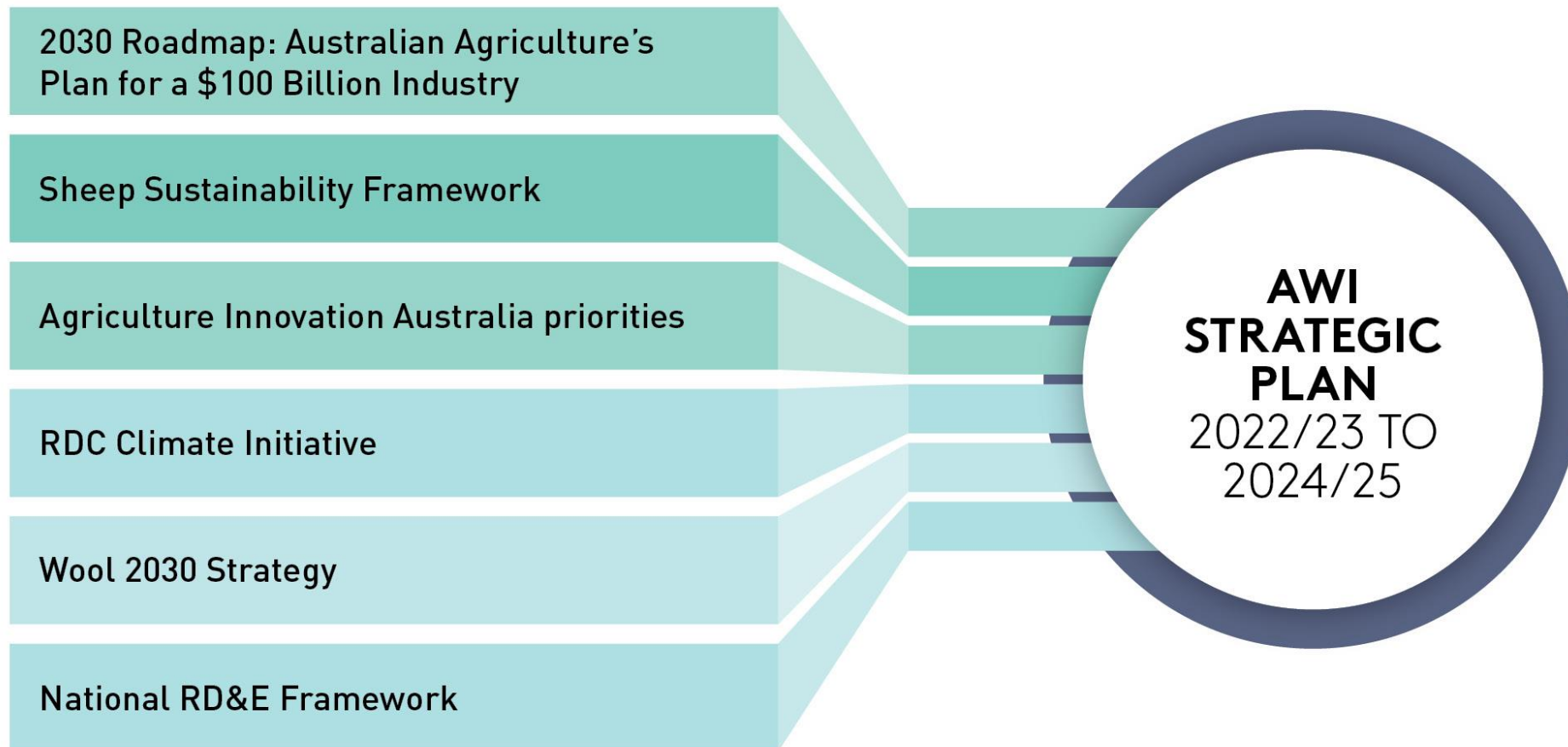

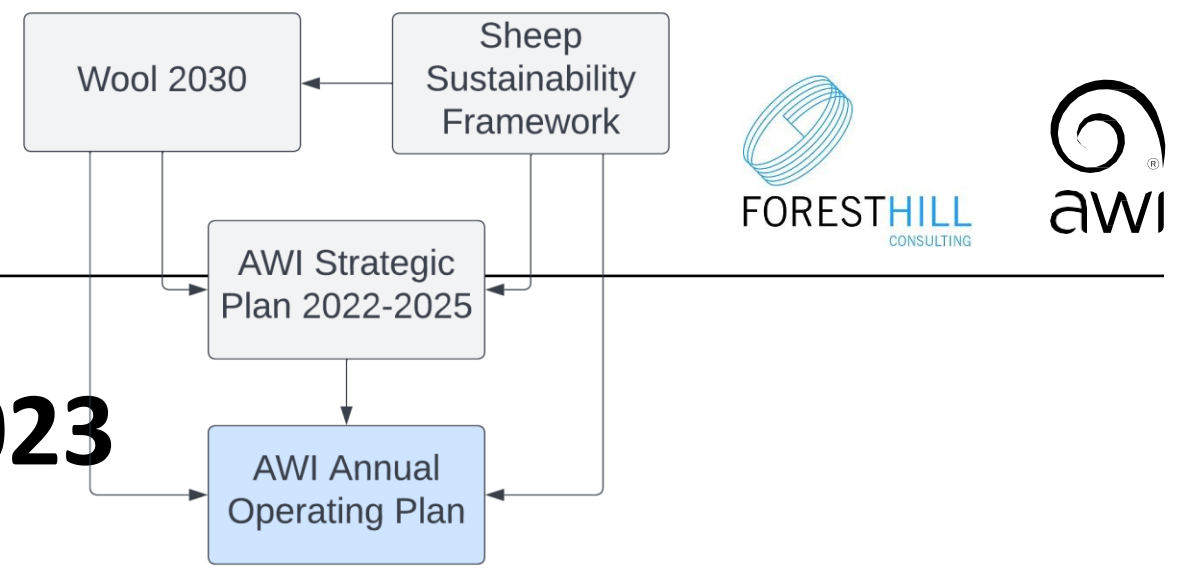
- High-level, 3-year plan for AWI’s activities
